SELF-TAPE FOCUS STUDY | An Activity

*This activity will not cover the script work portion (that is a separate course). This activity will focus on having a successful self-tape audition.

DIRECTIONS:

The absolute focus of this activity is for the purpose of having the most professional self-tape set up you can come up with, paying key attention to all concepts covered in this lesson's video lecture! *There is an included monologue you can utilize, but feel free to find your own sides, monologue, or prompt for this audition, as the focus is on the self-taping components!*

WHAT the Casting Call wants:

- You will be submitting the monologue attached as your self-tape audition (or other work)
- For this audition, the casting director prefers you to be off-book (i.e., the monologue is memorized), but will accept visually apparent scripts if necessary
- Please submit a self-tape audition using the attached sides
- Before your audition, please "slate" your name, the role you are auditioning for (make one up:)), and if you are represented by an agency or self-represented.

WHAT to Remember (SELF-TAPE FOCUS):

- FRAME: Try to get the tops of shoulders to the top of your head in this one.
- LIGHTING: Make sure your face is not darkened by shadows, and that the lighting does not cause any graininess in the footage. Try to make sure there are no harsh shadows from lighting being too close to the side of your face. <u>Bouncing</u> light off of a white sheet to reflect on the actors face, or <u>pushing</u> the light through a white sheet to diffuse the light rays is a tip for better lighting.
- BACKGROUND: Make sure your clothes do not blend into the background. Make sure your background is not distracting.
- SOUND: Pre-record a segment in the place you are considering for your self-tape, and listen to it. Is there background noise? Ensure your audio is good quality!
- Follow the directions of the casting call!
- Don't forget to "submit" your audition! Your "submission" will just be commenting your improvisation audition onto the "LESSON 6 | Self-Tape Auditions" topic, where you can receive peer-review!

THE AIRPORT | Comedic Monologue

Description: A young woman (or young man) returning from a long journey across the wildlands of Namibia, Africa, finds herself in culture-shock when she steps back into the airport of the United States.

I found myself elated with the bubbly personalities and diverse nationalities of all those surrounding me on the international flights and amongst the airports. Time flew by so fast on the flights from Windhoek to Johannesburg, Johannesburg to Qatar, and even on my flight from Qatar to JFK. However, everything changed when I stepped foot into the JFK airport. The moment I left the plane and walked down that hall, it was like walking out into fifteen lanes of traffic. Everyone followed one another in lines, either matching the speed of the random person in front of them, or grumbling about the elderly person walking too slow in front of them, and then passing them 90 miles an hour.
