

Strengths and Weaknesses of Different Teaching Styles

People often talk about traditional teaching and child-centered teaching as though they were somehow opposites, like two opposing armies in a war. It has long been fashionable to criticize traditional teaching. Yet both of these approaches to teaching have their own strengths and weaknesses. A good teacher will often use aspects of both traditional teaching and child-centred teaching many times within a single lesson.
