HELPFUL TIPS WHILE BUILDING YOUR RESUME & USING THE TEMPLATE

I left my own personal experience and titles in my resume so you can have more examples to go off of. I've provided a few tips and answers to some questions you may have as you type up your own resume with the <u>Basic Acting | Resume Template</u> provided.

- **Professional Emails:** gmails are quick and easy to make, and *free*. If your email address is *pinkfluffykittens@yahoo.com* or *g3trichfast54@hotmail.com* or even *janedoe1990@earthlink.net*, those are not the most professional email addresses. In general, you want to make your email as straightforward and easy to remember, in accordance to your acting/performing arts business.
 - For example: janedoeacting@earthlink.net is a more professional option.
 janedoe_actress@gmail.com is also an acceptable option. Try to avoid
 random numbers, including birth years. DEFINITELY AVOID anything
 other than your name or business, such as the first two bad examples in
 the first bullet-point.
- Do I have to include my phone number?: I strongly advise you to include one. Your job is to make sure you are easy to contact, especially by the casting director. Casting directors want to make sure you are a real person, and not spammy, and sometimes want to be able to just call you over the phone, just to test out your professionality. Having a phone number on your resume designed for casting call submissions is a good idea. Be wary of including your phone number on a personal website; however, if you do, consider a business-dedicated phone number.
- **Personal Websites:** These can be made without a fancy "domain name," which is the address for the website (i.e., I purchased the "domain name" www.emmapaunil.com). I recommend eventually investing in getting your own website if you are seriously considering your acting career. However, acting-dedicated social media sites, linked-in pages, IMDb links (basically an acting specific online database), or "<u>Actor's Access</u>" profile is also acceptable.
- Including Links: Pdf documents can still connect to external website links! With the digital age, this makes for a convenient way to include website links. However, if your resume is to be printed, make sure you have a resume version

that actually displays the entire web address for the link so that it can be typed. More often than not, however, the resume is now nearly 100% digital (i.e. even when the casting director asks for a printed resume, they tend to also ask for a digital copy).

 How do I make my link so it doesn't look like I slammed my face into the keyboard on my resume? For example,www.imdb.com/alsl100dfao42ieo/iha



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1. Highlight the text to which you would like to add your link.




2. Right click the highlighted text and select the "Link" option.
